Johannes Hofinger, SJ, was Associate Director of the Office of Religious Education in New Orleans from 1977 to 1984. Born in St. Johann, Austria, he was a Jesuit priest and a world-renowned missionary, evangelizer, teacher, and catechetical leader.

Keynote and Major Addresses

Most Rev. Richard J. Malone, S.T.L., Th.D., who now serves as Bishop-Designate, Diocese of Portland, ME, will present the Friday Morning Keynote Address entitled *I Have Called You Friends*. Discipleship deepens as we hear and respond to the Lord's invitation to grow in communion with Him and with one another. The wider our hearts are opened to the transforming grace of His love, the more He entrusts to us the challenges of mission. Friendship with Jesus is the fire on which courageous and hope-filled ministry is forged. The Bishop-Designate is a popular speaker at conferences across the country on the subjects of theology and catechesis and has produced and hosted television programs for Boston Catholic Television. In March 2000, Bishop Malone was appointed as Auxiliary Bishop for the Boston Diocese; he is former Director and past Secretary of Religious Education for the Boston Archdiocese and has served as a Chaplain for Harvard University and as Professor of Theology at St. John's Seminary in Boston.

Sr. Dr. Jamie T. Phelps, OP, Ph.D. will present the Friday Afternoon Major Address, *Following the Way of Jesus: Promoting Justice and Peace in the PostModern World*. We will address the meaning and mission of Jesus and the Christian disciples' call to live and teach the way of peace and justice in a global and culturally diverse world. Dr. Phelps is currently a Professor of Systematic Theology and Director of the Institute for Black Catholic Studies at Xavier University of Louisiana and has engaged in more than forty (40) years of public ministry in the Roman Catholic Church and in the wider community as a theologian, scholar, author, educator, pastoral minister, consultant, lecturer, liturgist, preacher, spiritual and retreat director, social worker, and administrator. Dr. Phelps is the editor of *Black and Catholic: The Challenge and Gift of Black Folk*, now in its second edition. Dr. Phelps is also the co-editor with Cyprian Davis, OSB, of *Stamped in the Image of God" African Americans as God's Image in Black* which is a part of a series, *American Identities: A Documentary History on American Catholicism* edited by Christopher Kaufman. In addition, Dr. Phelps has published more than 50 theological articles on issues of the mission of the Church, evangelization, inculturation, Christology, and spirituality.

Sr. Edith Prendergast, RSC, presently the Los Angeles Archdiocesan Director of Religious Education, will present the Saturday Morning Major Address, *Leading Anew for Mission and Ministry in Today's World*. Each year is new only if we are growing as persons and as communities of faith. Without this commitment to growth, our ministry becomes stale and predictable. We will explore the leadership, vision, competencies, gifts and spirituality that ground our efforts to speak the WORD anew. Sister holds a Doctorate in Ministry from Claremont School of Theology, and a Master's Degree in Theology from Boston College, and did her undergraduate studies at Maria Assumption College in London, England.
